Summary

Fifth grader Cody is thrilled to move to a new school. After all, the only things he was leaving behind were humiliation and rejection. His "New Me Journal" is to chronicle a changed man – no more Mr. Mess-up and Hello Mr. Cool! However, the best laid plans of mice, men, and pre-teen boys are another thing altogether. Ahhhhhhhl! The day before school starts a girl sees Cody in his underwear through an open dressing room door. Although she is not the "see and tell" type, Cody has recurrent nightmares of being caught in his underwear—hence the title of the book. Throughout the school year Cody has his ups (rescuing a hamster, improving his grades, running for class president) and downs (sending a valentine, bungling the talent show, trying to toilet train the cat) all told in a comical first person voice.

Author's Biography

Tom Birdseye is that rare individual, an adult who truly remembers and is able to vocalize the embarrassments and tribulations of adolescence. To make it even better, he is amazed at the realization that he is a writer by profession. In school he was left-handed, a poor speller, and he never could come up with an idea for anything he had to write in school. "Fortunately, the right people came along at the right time and helped me see past the hurdles, emphasizing instead the joy of the work and the satisfaction to be had in trying to uncover the important truths that can come out of fiction. Now I carry a small notebook at all times and am always on the lookout for material I can use in a story: ordinary people that would make good characters, the funny, telling, or poignant glimpses of life that are triggered by what I see and hear, and the wonderfully wise things people will say at the most unexpected times." Tom lives in Oregon with his wife and fellow writer Debbie Holsclaw Birdseye and their 2 daughters. He loves visiting classrooms and libraries and talking with children about the writing process.
