Million Dollar Baby won four Academy Awards, for best picture, best director, best actress and best supporting actor. Hilary Swank plays the young woman whose dream is to become a boxer. Clint Eastwood plays Dunn, the gruff old trainer, and Morgan Freeman is the caretaker at Dunn's gym. This is a film about drive, loyalty, ambition, and hard work. Rated PG-13.

The Incredibles DV 276

When a mysterious informant offers Bob Parr, formerly known as Mr. Incredible, the chance to play the role of superhero again he jumps at the opportunity, but it turns out to be a trap. The whole family must reveal their superhero powers to save Mr. Incredible and the world from destruction. With the voices of Craig T. Nelson, Holly Hunter, Samuel L. Jackson, and Jason Lee. Rated PG. 115 min.

Meet the Fockers DV 277

When Pam and Greg get their parents together it turns into one disaster after another. Greg's

parents, the unconventional Fockers, are the direct opposite of the uptight Byrneses, who travel to Miami to meet them for the first time. With Robert De Niro, Ben Stiller, Dustin Hoffman, and Barbra Streisand. Rated PG-13.

Phantom of the Opera DV 278

Gerard Butler stars as an obsessive musician hiding in the catacombs of the Paris Opera House. Known as the Phantom of the Opera, the creature masterminds a series of mysterious and terrifying events to further the career of Christine, a beautiful young singer. Christine, however, becomes caught up in her own love triangle between the Phantom and her new love, Raoul. Starring Gerard Butler, Emmy Rossum, and Patrick Wilson. Rated PG-13. 2 Hr. 35 min.

Ray (2 copies) DV 279

Jamie Foxx stars as Ray Charles, the blind musical genius who was known as the "Father of Soul". Born to a poor southern family, he lost his vision at the age of 7. He attended the state school for the blind at St. Augustine, Florida, where he learned to read and write music in Braille. He also learned to play clarinet, trumpet, saxophone,

and keyboards. Throughout his career he mastered a variety of musical styles, but he is best known for his singing and his piano playing. His hard work and drive for success made his life story extraordinary. Rated PG-13. 153 mins.

Shark Tales DV 280

Oscar, a lowly scrubber at the local Whale Wash, becomes an unlikely hero when he tells a great white lie. To keep his secret, Oscar teams up with another outcast, the vegetarian Great White Shark, Lenny, and the two become fast friends. When his lie begins to unravel, it's up to his friends Angie and Lenny to help him get out of trouble. With the voices of Will Smith, Robert De Niro, Renee Zellweger, Jack Black, Angelina Jolie, and Martin Scorsese. Rated PG. 1 Hr. 30 mins.

Finding Neverland DV 281

Johnnie Depp portrays James M. Barrie, the British playwright. He befriends a young widow with four boys, enjoys a variety of adventures with the children, and is inspired to write his timeless classic, Peter Pan. Rated PG. 101 mins.

To commemorate these milestone anniversaries, an event was held at the State Library on March 10, 2006.

Radio Reading Service for the Acadiana Parishes Being Considered

Imagine not being able to read your favorite grocery ad listings, your local paper with that

must have columnist, that certain
magazine or the latest must-read
Louisiana book. There are those in
Acadiana who cannot read normal
print due to physical or visual
impairments. A radio reading
service could provide access to
printed information for individuals

who cannot read conventional print because of blindness or a physical or learning disability.

Currently there is an attempt to compile a database consisting of people interested in such a service who reside in the following parishes: Calcasieu, Cameron, Vermilion, Avoyelles, Jefferson Davis, Allen, Evangeline, Saint Landry, Iberia, Saint Martin, Lafayette and Acadia. These parishes comprise the coverage area of the NPR-affiliate radio station KRVS that will be working on this project.

Textbooks are **not included** in the NLS talking-book and Braille program. Recording for the Blind and Dyslexic (RFB&D), a private, nonprofit organization, provides recorded educational books and related library services to people with print disabilities. Prospective borrowers must register with RFB&D.Textbooks in large print may be purchased from American Printing House for the Blind (APH) and Library Reproduction Service.
