Governor Bobby Jindal appointed Rebecca Hamilton to the Louisiana Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission. 2009 is the 200th anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birthday.

The Louisiana Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission serves to develop,

plan and coordinate statewide events that educate the public about the life and presidency of Abraham Lincoln and assist the state liaison to the national commission in overseeing and directing preparations for statewide programs and events.

"The very name 'Abraham Lincoln' is so iconic that it has almost become a monument itself," said Hamilton. "It is extraordinary that one man so changed the course of human history. I think it's important for us to take another look at his life and his presidency and learn from these. We all know that he epitomized honor, integrity and courage. But exactly what challenges did Lincoln meet in order to achieve this legacy? By serving on this commission, I hope to help expand the public's understanding about the 16th American President."

The 2008 National Survey of Public Library Funding and Technology Access is done by John Bertot working with the Information Institute at Florida State University. The survey is funded by the American Library Association and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and is part of a larger study managed by the American Library Association. U.S. Libraries Initiative: Broadband Assessment Project is funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, to collect data on the current state of library connectivity nationally, which will then be used to advocate for increased connectivity in public libraries.

# SLOL Contributes to Civil Rights Digital Library

The struggle for racial equality in the 1950s and 1960s is among the most far-reaching social movements in the nation's history and represents a crucial step in the evolution of American democracy. The Civil Rights Digital Library promotes understanding by providing primary sources and other educational materials, online articles and unedited news film from throughout the South.

The State Library of Louisiana contributed to this endeavor by providing photographs covering the story of Louisiana segregation, Baton Rouge demonstrations and other civil rights battles, including the march from Bogalusa. The public can access this material through the click of a mouse at www.civilrightslibrary.org. The digital library can be searched by key events, topics, media type and places, using an interactive map powered by Google.

The Civil Rights Digital Library is an initiative of the Digital Library of Georgia and is the most comprehensive digital archive of the national Civil Rights Movement to date. The Civil Rights Digital Library is a partnership among librarians, educators, and public broadcasters. It is supported by a National Leadership Grant for Libraries awarded to the University of Georgia by the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

# Longtime Allen Parish Library Trustee Passes Away

Memorial Services for Minnie Lou Lynch were held December 20, 2008, in Oakdale. Mrs. Lynch had a distinguished career, speaking on library affairs in 35 states and Canada. Her 52-year professional career also included that of a book reviewer for audiences, entertainment she called "Book Theater."

Lynch was the founder and organizer of the public library in Oakdale. During that time, she led the political effort to achieve library service for the entire parish which led to the creation of the Allen Parish Library System in 1957. She served on the library's Board of Control from its inception until her death. At the state level, Lynch presided as the Executive Director of Louisiana's two Governor's Conferences on Libraries. On the national level, she served as President of the American Library Trustee Association, a division of the American Library Association.

She received many honors during her lifetime of library service and advocacy, including the American Library Association's Trustee Citation and recognition by them as an "Extraordinary Library Advocate of the 20th Century," Louisiana's Outstanding Trustee Award, and The Southwestern Library Association's Honorary Life membership. In 2000, she received the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities Award for her Lifetime Contribution to the Humanities. The Town Talk honored her as a Woman of Distinction in 2002.

In 2007, as part of the Allen Parish Library's 50th Anniversary, the library Board of Control established a lasting reference to Mrs. Lynch's 60-plus years of volunteer activity on behalf of libraries. They named a renovation to the Oakdale Branch Library "LynchPlaza."

# George Rodrigue Prints: A Catalogue Raisonne 1970-2000

eorge Rodrigue Prints: A Cata-Jlogue Raisonne 1970-2000 is a unique glimpse of the prints of George Rodrigue, as well as a biographical piece of the man as an artist. Contributors to the work are George Rodrigue, Wendy Wolfe Rodrigue and Harry N. Abrams, all of which create a better understanding of the artist known for his Blue Dog. The Blue Dog has become an artistic icon, easily recognizable as the work of artist George Rodrigue. The prints of George Rodrigue are perhaps some of his most popular pieces and George Rodrigue Prints: A Catalogue Raisonne 1970-2000 offers viewers over six hundred lithographs and silkscreens, some never before published.

George Rodrigue was born in 1944, the son of a bricklayer from New Iberia, Louisiana. He painted what he knew, the Cajuns and life in rural South Louisiana. As his fame grew, he often created posters for Louisiana festivals, such as Festivals Acadiens, Louisiana State Fair and Breaux Bridge Crawfish Festival. In 1976, he published The Cajuns of George Rodrigue, which contained one hundred fifty-six reproductions of his paintings. His Cajun paintings were becoming more and more popular, as were the series of portraits of famous Louisianians. His most popular creation is the Blue Dog, which first appeared in 1984 in the book Bayou by Chris Segura, and then

silkscreen prints appeared in 1990. The *Blue Dog* is based on Tiffany, a terrier owned by Rodrigue, who had passed away some years before. As the years passed, the *Blue Dog* could be seen in almost all of Rodrigue's paintings and prints. For example, the painting *Morning Glories Blonde*, a silkscreen done in 1988 had the *Blue Dog* added in 1991 and titled *Morning Glories Blonde with Tiffany*.

George Rodrigue Prints: A Catalogue Raisonne 1970-2000 is a coffee-table size book with an appealing cover of the *Blue Dog*, though he is a bit more gray than blue. Through the years, the dog becomes a more vibrant blue, or green, yellow or red, painted singly or in multiples reminiscent of Warhol. The dog is painted on a tree stump, tomb, box, amid flowers, trees, bayou scenes, in the desert, in a Campbell's soup can, draped in the American flag, decked out for Mardi Gras and oodles more. He is a dog that Rodrigue aficionados love and one that has highlighted the career of George Rodrigue. Almost every page of this 256 resource is covered with colorful imagery. The Forward and Introduction offer biographical insight into George Rodrigue. Other chapters include 1970-89 Bayou Scenes & Event Posters, Blue Dog I, Blue Dog II, Blue Dog III,

Blue Dog IV, Blue Dog V, Blue Dog VI, Commemorative & Special Editions, Bodies and Remastered Digital Prints,

and *Blue God VII*. There is an excellent Chronology of the artist and his works, as well as an index to help locate desired pieces.

George Rodrigue Prints: A Catalogue Raisonne 1970-2000 would be a fine addition to any library's collection on art, as well as make a wonderful gift.
