Louisiana Writer Award

Award-winning author and illustrator of best-selling children's books William Joyce has been named winner of the 2008 Louisiana Writer Award. He is being honored by the Louisiana Center for the Book in the State Library of Louisiana for his extraordinary contributions to the state's literary heritage exemplified by his body of work.

"This is the first time that a children's author has been honored with the Louisiana Writer Award," said Lt. Gov. Mitch Landrieu, whose office in the Department of Culture, Recreation and Tourism oversees

the State Library. "Mr. Joyce has not only been successful at reaching children through his writing and illustrations, but he has directed his talent towards creating wonderfully playful animated worlds for both television and film. This artist truly represents the talent emerging from Louisiana's literary culture."

Master creator William Joyce wrote his first book in the fourth grade. Since then he has produced awardwinning, best-selling classics that are loved by both children and adults. Hailed by *Newsweek* as one of the top 100 people to watch in the new millennium, William Joyce's distinct and striking drawings and imagina-




tive storytelling depict a world full of whimsy, fun, and adventure - the kind of world a child would want to jump into.

State Librarian Rebecca Hamilton is particularly pleased that the Center for the Book is recognizing an artist who reaches children. "If we take a child and introduce him to the fun and joy that comes from knowing characters in a story, if we are able to inspire that child and see the first sparks of wonderment that come from reading, then we know we've set that child on a course that will be stayed throughout his or her life," said Hamilton. "William Joyce's work shines at this. His stories are playful, full of joy and mischievousness and children open up to that quality and want to know more."

The State Library of Louisiana will honor Joyce at an award ceremony during the sixth annual Louisiana Book Festival on October 4, 2008.

"Coming up with a concept that tempered my rage with some hope was not easy, but I got inspiration from an old photograph of Mardi Gras in the '30's by J. Guttman, called the



SLOL checks out planet Earth from space

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

SLOL Announces LYRCA Ballots

The Louisiana Young Readers' Choice Award ballots have been announced. Now in its ninth year, the reading enrichment program of the State Library of Louisiana is underwritten by Capitol

One. Last year, more than 20,000 students read and voted for titles on the 2008 ballots. It is model collaborative reading program involving students, teachers and public librarians in all regions of the state. Students in grades three through eight are encouraged to read the high-quality books that are on carefully selected ballots: one for grades 3-5 and another for grades 6-8. Using specially prepared study guides, teachers incorporate the books into the curriculum. Voting day is an exciting time in many schools and libraries throughout Louisiana as the students cast their votes, sometimes using the voting booths supplied by the Secretary of State's Election Division.

A committee of school and public librarians chooses the 15 recent children's titles for each age group that comprise the annual LYRCA ballots. The lists offer a well-balanced array of excellent, enjoyable books in various genres, including fiction, nonfiction, folklore and poetry. Tallies of the student votes are due to the State Library from the schools by February 1, 2009.

urricanes have always been a threat to the Gulf Coast. Recently, hurricanes Katrina and Rita wreaked havoc with this area. In 1957, Hurricane Audrey devastated the region. Cameron parish suffered major losses and *Audrey Remembered* captures the horror and heroism that occurred in late June, 1957.

Audrey Remembered was compiled by the newsroom staff of the American Press newspaper in Lake Charles, Louisiana. It is a 50th anniversary retrospective that was published in 2007. The black and

white imagery is often painful to view. With each image we are vividly reminded of the devastation that hurricanes are capable of, both to property and lives. The narrative is equally impressive, giving a detailed account of the hurricane in *Audrey, the Saga of a Storm,* as well as resident's recollections in *Death Came in the Night* and *One Family's Nightmare*.

Audrey Remembered is well researched and compiled, offering readers a glimpse into the effects of a hurricane. Hurricane Audrey is compared to Hurricane Rita, which

hit the same area. Both hurricanes battered Lake Charles, Louisiana and Beaumont, Texas and areas in between. Both had high winds, storm surges and rain. Hurricane Audrey claimed over 500 lives, where Rita took close to ten. Both hurricanes destroyed Cameron parish.

Audrey Remembered should be a part of any library's hurricane collection. It was a devastating storm that caused major destruction.

Today, we have a small modest landing

strip for small planes, but most Union Parish residents do not know that Charles Lindburgh once landed his plane in Union Parish to visit his friend and inventor--a native of Union Parish. History here is rich with stories, legends, and documented cases of murder, espionage, and intrigue--all the action and adventure of a great novel or a blockbuster movie. This event, Ghosts of Union Parish Past will grab audience's attention while they learn about local history."

The content of the presentation and publication will focus on stories from our earliest residents, the Native Americans to a 2008 Ghost Story in the Davis and Company Restaurant. Topics will also make an effort to include history from each of the communities in the parish: Downsville, Bernice, Spearsville, Marion, Lillie, and Farmerville.
