E-Rate Funding Commitment Received

The State Library has received approval for their annual application for E-Rate, a program that provides discounts ranging from 20% to 90% towards the purchase of telecommunications services, Internet access and internal connections (wiring) for public libraries and schools.

The nearly \$1 million funding commitment will pay 79% of the cost of direct Internet connections for Louisiana public libraries and the State Library. This will help pay for monthly Internet and telecommunications access.



State Librarian Rebecca Hamilton Speaks at Baton Rouge Press Club



State Librarian Rebecca Hamilton was invited to speak at a luncheon of the Baton Rouge Press Club on August 6. Her presentation was aired on Louisiana Public Broadcasting that night.

After briefly going over the history of the State Library and how it serves as a resource for Louisiana public libraries, Hamilton gave an overview of the State Library's role in serving citizens during and after the hurricanes. In addition to giving an overview of a few of the many services that the State Library offers, Hamilton took questions from the audience.

NOPL's Mid-City Branch Opens

The Mid-City Branch, the first of several New Orleans temporary branches funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation's Gulf Coast Libraries Project, opened to the public on June 11, 2007, to serve a large population that extends from Lakeview to Hollygrove, as well as Mid-City. In addition to regular library services, the spacious 3500-square foot storefront offers Internet access and word processing to library card holders, fax and photocopying services.




Viewpoint

Public Screening of Award-winning documentary "Reconstructing Creole"

The St. Charles Parish Library will present two screenings of the award-winning documentary "Reconstructing Creole" during September. The documentary chronicles the rebuilding of the historic Laura Plantation and explores the history and culture of its 19th century Creole residents.

This is the first full-length documentary for New Orleans producer and director Jennifer John, who is the founder of Fresh Media, a New Orleans based production company. John is an instructor with Loyola University's School of Mass Com-

munication and a former reporter for WWL-TV in New Orleans.

"Reconstructing Creole" offers a view of the culture, race and history of one Louisiana Creole plantation. It explores the unique history of Louisiana Creoles through the memoir of 19th century matriarch Laura Locoul Gore and the eventual restoration of her plantation. The documentary weaves past and present with music by 19th century Creole composer Louis Moreau Gottschalk and original works from Louisiana musicians Bruce "Sunpie" Barnes, Mitch Caponetto and Adam Kennedy.

"Reconstructing Creole" won Best Documentary Feature Award at the Hollywood HD/DV Festival in April 2007, was chosen as an Official Selection of the Boston International Film Festival, and also received an Award of Merit from the Leadership in History Awards Committee.

The documentary will premiere in St. Charles Parish at West Regional Library in Luling September 6 at 6:30 p.m., with a second screening September 7 at 10:30 a.m. at East Regional Library in Destrehan. A representative from Laura Plantation will give a short introduction and answer audience questions.

The event will include a remote radio broadcast, a large used book sale, local vendor sales, refreshments for sale, and outstanding professional performances. Performers include Steve Smith, pianist, storytellers, Calliope Puppets, Tamizey Drum & Dance Group, and Charlo and the Southern Traditions Band.

This event is partly funded through Decentralized Arts Funding as administered by the Acadiana Arts Council, with additional support from the Friends of the Library.

Now Offering Online Resources for Early Childhood Service Providers

The State Library of Louisiana's Early Childhood Services web pages located at http://www.state.lib.la.us/la_dyn_templ.cfm?doc_id=152 were created with the needs of many people in mind: Public library staff, early care and education staff and teachers, parents, and caregivers. This resource provides access to information pertinent to those who work with children ages birth - 5 years.

Users will find instructions for accessing the State Library's new Big Book Collection of over

400 titles of oversized children's books available through Interlibrary Loan. For those who wish to purchase big books, there are links to

big book publishers and distributors.

Those who work with children under age three will find use for the book selection guidelines in *Louisiana's Early*

Learning Guidelines and Program Standards: Birth through Three published by the Louisiana Department of Social Services. A section on the importance of brain development in young children includes a short Power Point presentation entitled "What's Going On Up There?" Another presentation explains what early literacy is and why it's important. For read aloud programs for preschool children, the State Library presents "LET'S READ! Story Programs for Groups Ages 3 - 5," read aloud guidelines and books recommended by 995 contributors to a statewide survey. In the Nursery Rhyme Resources section users can download printable mini books, recently created by the State Library, for children to color and keep.

Other sections include links to: Early literacy activities online, grant possibilities, Louisiana's state-subsidized early care and education programs and their standards, statistics, and printable tip sheets for parents and caregivers. Eden Park Branch Library Receives Rose Award



The Baton Rouge chapter of the American Institute of Architects has awarded the Rose Award, its highest design award, to the Eden Park Branch Library. Opened to the public on January 11, 2007, the newly developed Eden Park Branch Library includes a covered drivethrough at the entrance and a beautifully landscaped courtyard with covered seating area. The 14,026 square foot library houses more than 55,000 books, 70 magazine titles, 10 newspaper subscriptions, and 3,500 videos, DVDs, audiobooks and CDs.

A lovely feature of the new library is its remarkable stained glass at the entrance window, designed by Steven Wilson. The artist used reflecting images of "flying books" as well as the lamp of learning, which reference the architectural frieze of the original East Baton Rouge Library building on Laurel Street. This new branch also includes state-of-the-art raised modular flooring to provide flexibility and facilitate wiring and other future technology needs of the structure, as well as state-of-the-art shelving with attached lighting, a new design feature for the East Baton Rouge Parish Library system, making the library branch among one of a handful in the country and the first local public facility of its kind.

SLOL Upgrades KLAS

The State Library upgraded the Keystone Library Automation System computer system for Services for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. The system, known as KLAS, was upgraded to Version 7 in August 2007.

KLAS is designed specifically for the unique needs of libraries serving blind and disabled patrons. It is used at more than 20 such libraries nationwide. These libraries need to be able to keep extensive lists of patron requests, track multiple copies of the same book, and send out new books as soon as old ones are returned through the mail.

The SBPH library staff spent three days with a trainer learning the new system and its many upgraded features. The upgraded computer system, which uses a GUI (Graphic User Interface), allows staff to use many Windows features that were previously unavailable. Version 7 has improved the speed of many processes. Being able to have several functions available at once allows library staff to work more efficiently and effectively. In addition, record keeping is improved with KLAS 7, as there are many useful reports built in that allow the library to pull statistical data with ease.

The Calcasieu Parish Public Library is coordinating weekly readings by librarians and local celebrities to school and day care groups for the "This is Our Land" art exhibit at Historic City Hall Arts and Cultural Center in Lake Charles.

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The State Library of Louisiana is one of our state's greatest resources for research information, government documents, genealogical data, books in Braille, audiobooks and more.

The State Library's mission is to build an informed, literate and democratic society by ensuring access to informational, cultural and recreational resources, especially those resources unique to Louisiana.

LSDDP And SLOL Work Together to Reach Goal

The Louisiana State Documents Depository Program and the State Library accomplished an important goal in early August 2007. Every Louisiana state document received and shipped out in July had a full bibliographic record available in the State Library catalog. This means that the other 40 depository libraries do not need to do their own cataloging to have the documents quickly available to their users. This is the

first time in the history of the LS-DDP that all of the newly received documents had full cataloging immediately available.

These are OCLC MARC records with LC subject headings and authority headings. Libraries can derive the records from the State Library catalog using Z39.50 protocol at no charge or download them from OCLC, if they are OCLC members.

The July state documents shipment had 270 titles of which 86 (32%) were new to the depository program. The shipment had 2,456 items, including all of the bills, resolutions and daily journals from the 2007 regular legislative session; 738 items were not from that session. The July shipment was a little above the 2007 monthly average for Louisiana documents.







Building Louisiana: Book The Legacy of the Public Works Administration

Many social, economic and geographical influences helped build Louisiana. In the 1930s, the Public Works Administration (PWA) was one of them. The PWA helped get people back to work after the Great Depression, and Louisiana was only one of the states to benefit.

The PWA constructed more than 228 buildings in Louisiana at an estimated cost of \$52,292,697.00. Many of these PWA constructed buildings are still in use. Projects ranged from university buildings, city halls, courthouses, schools and utility plants to streets, sidewalks and more.

Little is available in published form on the many Louisiana projects completed by the PWA - until now. In *Building Louisiana - The Legacy of the Public Works Administration*, sociologist and New Deal historian Robert D. Leighninger, Jr., considers PWA in Louisiana in detail.

The book offers a comprehensive account of the PWA program in Louisiana, from its beginnings in response to the Great Depression to the completed PWA structures located throughout the state. It is an interesting read and a wonderful resource.

Notable features include many black and white illustrations, tables of statistics and a complete inventory of non-federal PWA projects in Louisiana. The inventory is 81 pages, alphabetical by town, with a list of projects completed, including the project name, the engineer and contractor, the resident engineer inspector, the total cost and year completed.

For persons needing construction information on a particular Louisiana PWA project, this would be a great source to consult, as well as the individual chapters devoted to the Cultural and Physical Infrastructure. For persons interested in the history of the PWA in Louisiana, there are chapters on How to Respond to a Great Depression, Huey Long Versus the PWA, the Second Louisiana Purchase, Scandal and more. A nice index rounds out this valuable resource.

Building Louisiana - The Legacy of the Public Works Administration will enhance any library's collection on the Public Works Program in Louisiana or be a valuable reference resource for historical public works and infrastructure information.
