Escape from Saigon: How a Vietnam War Orphan Became an American Boy by Andrea Warren. Farrar, Straus & Giroux (Melanie Kroupa Books), 2004. 128 p.

Summary

This is the story of an Amerasian boy named Long, who lived in Vietnam with his mother and grandmother. His father was a white American soldier who abandoned Long's mother. After Long's mother died, his grandmother took care of him, but poverty and the hardship of war forced her to send Long to the Holt International Orphanage. Long felt abandoned and rejected. Because Long was half-American, he had what the Communists called "blood of the enemy." It was very risky for him to remain in Vietnam. Just before the city of Saigon was invaded by the Communists, Operation Babylift flew Long to Chicago where he met his adoptive family and assumed his American name of Matthew Ray Steiner. Operation Babylift evacuated 2,242 orphans from Vietnam. The book includes touching photographs of Long and other Vietnamese children. It also includes author-recommended resources about Amerasian adoption and Vietnam.

Andrea Warren wrote her first stories for publication while teaching English and history at a high school in Hastings, Nebraska. She later moved to Kansas to attend the University of Kansas to complete a master's degree in magazine journalism. Ms. Warren writes for young adult readers because she remembers voraciously at that age. Warren's books focus on significant historic events as experienced by young adults living during that time. Warren now lives in Kansas City, Kansas and is the mother of four children. Her daughter, Alison, was a Vietnamese orphan evacuated by Operation Babylift.
