We Zipped Into the Future

The 2001 "Zip Into The Future" summer reading program was an out-of-this world success! More than 1,050 books were read from June 11 to August 13. A total of 89 children and young adults, ranging in age from 4 to 20 years old, registered to participate in this year's program. Everyone who registered received a folder with a reading log and activity sheets.

A total of 64 readers completed the program and they all received a "Zip Into the Future" T-shirt. In addition, 46 readers received a special prize book of their own for having read 12 (or more!) books. Finally, at the end of the program, a special drawing was held and four summer readers each won a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond.

"Zip Into the Future" was made possible through a grant from the State Library of Louisiana and from the on-going charitable support of the Mrs. W. Carruth Jones Foundation for the Blind and Physically Handicapped.

Ask Your Reader Advisor

QUESTION: I think I am missing some cassette tapes. I have

cassettes numbered 1 and 5, but not 2, 3, and 4.

answer: It is unlikely that you are missing any parts of your book on tape. Our cassette books are recorded on 4-tracks. This means that each cassette contains 4 sides. Just remember that Cassette 1 contains sides 1, 2, 3 and 4, Cassette 5 contains sides 5, 6, 7 and 8, and so on.

You can also tell how many cassettes your book should have by looking on the outside label and checking for a number followed by the letter "C." For example, 1C indicates 1 cassette; 2C indicates 2 cassettes, and so on.

QUESTION: I can't find the book I am looking for in the catalogs you sent me. How can I find out if you have it?

ANSWER: Remember that you are never limited to just the books you see in the catalogs. It is best to think of the catalogs you receive as a guide for selecting books. The easiest way to find out if we have a particular book is to telephone your reader advisor. We can search the entire NLS collection for authors, titles, and subject areas.
