As you will read in this newsletter, SBPH has experienced many ups and downs in the past few months. We lost a dearly valued member of our staff in October. The 7th annual Louisiana Book Festival was held October 17, and it took the whole State Library team, along with 350 volunteers and a beautiful fall day to bring about a very successful event. Mark your calendars for October 30, 2010, for the next one! We are coping with a very stringent state budget this year.

But the best news of all is that we are finally bringing the long-awaited digital books and players to our patrons. So far, 280 of our readers have the new players, and they report that the new machine is wonderful. It is easy to use, the sound quality is great, and there is no need to rewind or flip tapes over. This library will be receiving regular shipments of new digital players from NLS. As fast as we get the shipments in, we will be sending the players out to the people on our waiting lists. If you have not put your name on the waiting list for a new player, please call your reader advisor. We are anxious to share this new technology with everyone.

Once you have a digital player, you may wish to sign up for BARD, the digital book

downloading program at a secure NLS web site. BARD allows you to download books to a high speed computer, to transfer those files to an NLS-type cartridge or a simple flash drive, and then to play those books on your digital player. There

It Was A Creative Summer At the Library!

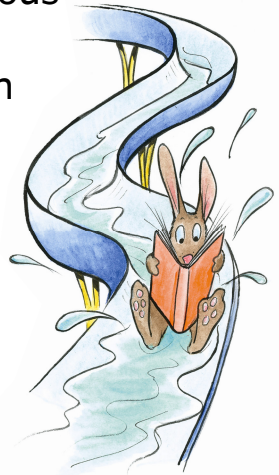

Braille Readers Are Leaders 27th Annual Contest for Blind Youth and Adults 2009-2010

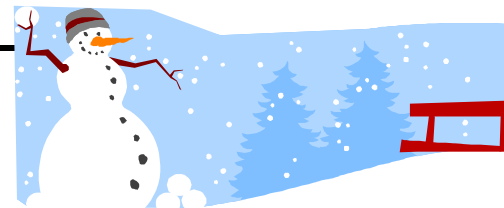

A Christmas Secret by Anne Perry. BR 16908, RC 64292, LP 19510. A London vicar spends Christmas in an isolated village substituting for the local Reverend, who has taken a last-minute holiday.

The Christmas Thief by Mary Higgins Clark and Carol Higgins Clark. BR 15551, RC 58834, LP 19092. During a vacation weekend in Vermont, a lottery winner and her friend, private investigator Regan Reilly, become involved in the case of a stolen Christmas tree.

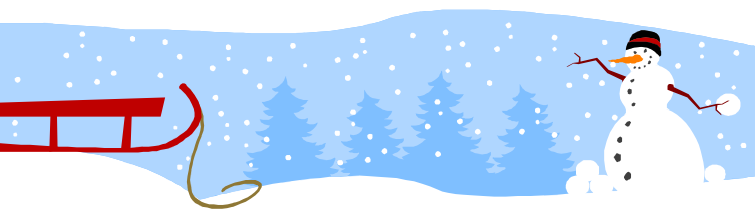
the trip, he meets his former lover and sparks fly until Tom's girlfriend shows up in Chicago. Bestseller.

Includes recipes and discussion questions.

Follow the Star: Christmas Stories That Changed My Life by T.D. Jakes. LP 16837. The author's personal remembrances of the Christmas season.

General Washington's Christmas Farewell: A Mount Vernon Homecoming, 1783 by Stanley Weintraub. RC 57652. Drawing on Washington's letters and private papers, the author recreates Washington's journey back home to Virginia after the Revolutionary War in time for Christmas.

The Handmaid and the Carpenter Elizabeth Berg. RC 63114, LP 19512. In this interpretation of the nativity story, Mary and Joseph alternately relate the tale of their



romance and betrothal. Follows the gospel version.

A NASCAR Holiday by Kimberly Raye, Roxanne St. Claire, Debra Webb. RC 65327. Three short stories involving romance and NASCAR drivers.

The Purpose of Christmas by Rick Warren. BR 18221, RC 67520. The author uses biblical scripture to examine the origins of Christmas.

The Red Gloves Collection by Karen Kingsbury. RC 64411. Four novels of family and faith at Christmas. In Hannah's Hope a teenager seeks her biological father stationed in Iraq.

Silver Bells: A Holiday Tale by Luanne Rice. BR 15767, RC 59402, LP 17501. Widowed Canadian farmer Christopher Byrne journeys to New York City every December to sell Christmas trees. Manhattan librarian Catherine Tierney buys her trees from Chris and soon love is in the air.

Under the Mistletoe by Mary Balogh. RC 63665. Regency England, early 1800s. Five holiday stories whose lonely characters unexpectedly find love and joy.

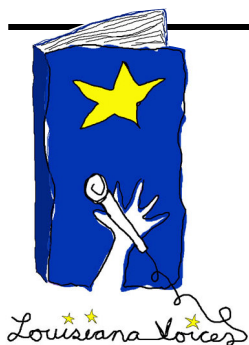

Reconnect with an old friend or meet a new one – Choice Magazine Listening is now available for free digital download from the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. Produced six times a year, each issue contains unabridged articles from over 100 quality publications such as National Geographic, Smithsonian, Sports Illustrated and the New Yorker. Every other month, this free service offers its subscribers eight hours of articles, fiction and poetry read by professional voices. 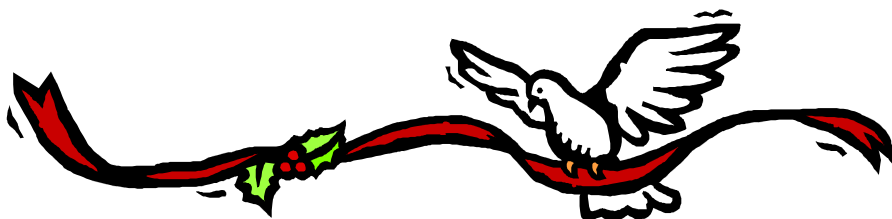
Math and Science Camp
