


# Louisiana's Lieutenant Governor becomes newest recording star

Jn Monday, June 28, 2004, Louisiana Voices recorded its 140th book with Lieutenant Governor Mitch Landrieu. The Lieutenant Governor read the 2005 Louisiana Young Readers' Choice Award Ballot book, The Boy Who Drew Cats, by Lafcadio Hearn, adapted by Marge Hodges. Celebrated author Hearn (1850-1904) spent ten years of his writing career in New Orleans.

Later in July, Lieutenant Governor Landrieu began production of two more children's titles and he is interested in recording many more.

Inspired by him, several staff members of his office also volunteer on a weekly basis as narrators, producers and reviewers.

Every year, Louisiana students are invited to help choose the winner

of the Young Reader's Choice Award. Kids who read three or more of the titles on the annual Young Readers' Choice Award ballot may vote for their favorite book. The program has been expanded to include titles for students in grades six, seven and eight.
