Bryson and his family move to New
Hampshire where he records his
impressions and opinions as a returning
American.

The Kalahari Typing School for Men by Alexander McCall Smith.

(RC 56235, LP 15854)

The owner of <u>The No. 1 Ladies' Detective</u> <u>Agency</u> (RC 55503) in Botswana, copes with new problems. She takes in two troubled orphans and becomes engaged; mentors her assistant who wants to start a typing school and find a husband; and faces competition from a new detective shop. Bestseller.

Angel's Flight by Michael Connelly. (RC 47526, LP 9874)
Los Angeles detective Harry Bosch investigates the murder of Howard Elias, an African American attorney who

specialized in suing the police department. Every city cop is a suspect, and civil unrest becomes a real concern. Strong language, violence, and descriptions of sex. Bestseller.

Chasing the Dime by Michael Connelly. (RC 55050, LP 14746, BR 14466)

Dr. Henry Pierce moves while in the midst of a computer technology battle and a fight for project funding. His new, and very busy, telephone number belonged to a dazzling online call girl, who seems to be missing. Violence, strong language, and some explicit descriptions of sex. Bestseller.

City of Bones by Michael Connelly. (RC 54156, LP 14088)

The scattered bones of an abused, murdered child are discovered in the Hollywood hills. Detective Harry Bosch takes the cold case and tracks the corpse to a missing boy from 1980. Bosch also begins an affair with a rookie cop as the case takes on strange twists. Violence and strong language.

Gardens of New Orleans: Exquisite Excess (RCL 382)

For generations, landscape architects and residents have created magnificent public and private gardens in New Orleans.

You Are My Friend: A Celebration of Friendship by Hal Larson. (RCL 399) Insights into the virtues of friendship from

classic literature to modern songwriting around the world are eloquently expressed in themed chapters.

Al Capone Does My Shirts by Gennifer Choldenko. (RC 58456, BR 15982) 1935. Twelve-year-old Moose Flanagan moves to Alcatraz Island when his father takes a job at the maximum-security prison there. Moose struggles to make friends and cares for his older autistic sister while their mother applies for the girl's acceptance to a special school. Newbery honor winner. For grades 6-9.

The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time by Mark Haddon. (RC 56893, BR 15215)

Fifteen-year-old Christopher, who exhibits behavioral problems associated with autism, investigates the murder of his neighbor's dog. Some strong language. Bestseller. For senior high readers and adults.

Olivia by Ian Falconer. (BR 13074)
Olivia, a preschooler pig, lives with her mother, father, and younger brother Ian.
Olivia is good at lots of things—dressing up, singing songs, building sand castles, dancing, and painting on walls. And she is very good at wearing people out. PRINT/BRAILLE. For preschool-grade 2.

Their Eyes Were Watching God by Zora Neale Hurston.

This classic novel tells the story of Janie, a handsome black woman, and her three marriages.

How Stella Got Her Groove Back by Terry McMillan.

Forty-two-year-old Stella Payne, a successful, divorced black woman, decides on impulse to go to Jamaica while her son is visiting his father. Not expecting romance, Stella is shocked to be wooed by a twenty-year-old Jamaican student. Strong language and explicit descriptions of sex.

by Gwynne Forster. (LP 14137)

An African-American family copes with trying to fulfill their sick mother's requests. Three children are faced with either choosing between operating the family business or building their own careers.

Your Best Life Now: 7 Steps to Living at Your Full Potential by Joel Osteen.

A Christian minister's advice on finding personal fulfillment. Bestseller.

A Charlie Brown Christmas (DV 105)

Charlie Brown sets out to find the true meaning of Christmas. Rated G. 25 min.

Election by Tom Perrotta. (RC 47114)

Faculty advisor Jim McAllister is having personal problems when he gets seriously, but humorously, involved in a New Jersey suburban high school election. Some strong language and some descriptions of sex.

Tuck Everlasting by Natalie Babbitt. (RC 50587, LP 15632, BR 13834) Winnie Foster is ten when she meets seventeen-year-old Jesse Tuck in the woods and learns that his family hasn't aged in eighty-seven years since drinking from a secret spring. For grades 4-7.

The Scandalous Summer of Sissy LeBlanc by Lorraine Despres. (RCL 177)

It's a hot Louisiana summer afternoon in 1956 when Sissy spots her high school sweetheart, Parker Davidson, back after 15 years. While trying to keep it a secret, they begin an affair that has the whole town talking. Explicit descriptions of sex.

Elvis, Hank and Me by Horace Logan. (RCL 333)

Explore the roots of modern country music as told by the man responsible for turning a weekly radio show in Shreveport, The Louisiana Hayride, into one of the nations most prominent musical venues. Some strong language.

East Baton Rouge Parish Library Offers Assistive Technology

The Main (Goodwood) location of the East Baton Rouge Parish Library is proud to offer blind, visually impaired, physically handicapped, and reading disabled patrons a special workstation equipped with assistive technology. The workstation itself is adjustable and holds a 22inch monitor. After surveying professionals in the field, the staff decided to equip the station with the three most often used software products: JAWS, Open-Books, and Zoom-Text. The station also comes

with a printer and will soon have large print keyboard labels.

While this wonderful opportunity is now only available at the Main Library, there are plans in the future to include an identical special needs workstation at the Delmont Gardens, Bluebonnet Regional, Carver, and Baker branches. With stations across the parish, the library hopes to accommodate the greatest majority of people. Users must have a library card, or they may obtain a guest pass in order to use the computer.

Computer users with special needs have priority to use the assistive technology and with that in mind, the library is allowing users to reserve it ahead of time. Assistive Technology users may request an extended session of up to 3 hours at a time. To do so you may call the Reference desk at (225) 231-3750. You may also call Elizabeth Myers, Head of Computer Division, at (225) 231-3720 for any questions or comments.

SBPH commends the East Baton Rouge Parish Library system for taking this step in providing assistive technology for blind, visually impaired, physically handicapped, and reading disabled. We hope that our readers within the Baton Rouge area will enjoy and take advantage of this very important service.

Assistive Technology Loans

LATAN's Assistive Technology Loan Program provides an alternative. affordable source of funding to assist people with disabilities through a special loan program. Loan application eligibility is open to any individual in Louisiana with a disability. Loans, for example, may be used to help purchase computers with adaptive devices, vehicle modifications, wheelchairs, adaptive home modifications, prosthetics and/ or orthotics, or any other item that improves or maintains the independence of a person. 
