# Textbook Source Goes Digital in July

Recording for the Blind & Dyslexic (RFB&D) is a nonprofit organization that loans recorded textbooks and works of nonfiction to qualified blind, visually impaired and dyslexic individuals. These books have proven very helpful to students and scholars. RFB&D is not a free library service like SBPH. They charge a registration fee, as well as an annual membership fee. Many SBPH patrons are also members of RFB&D.

RFB&D is switching from books on cassette to books on compact discs (CDs) and eliminating cassette tapes from their program as of July 1, 2007. In order to listen to these special format CDs, it will be necessary to purchase a special Victor Vibe CD player from RFB&D. RFB&D is striving to make the switch to digital a smooth one. If you used them years ago while a student and prior to 1996, you're still an RFB&D lifetime member.

If you received a cassette message in early January from RFB&D President John Kelly about the digital transition, you can receive a Free Victor Vibe player. Just call RFB&D's Member Services Department at 800-221-4792, verify your membership status and ask for promotion code DM104. To qualify, you must be a current

# Digital Talking Book Machine Update

Editor's Note: In early May, Margaret Harrison attended the National Library Service Conference in Baltimore, Maryland. At this Conference, representatives attended from both the southern and northern regional libraries. The main topic was the DTBM, or, the Digital Talking Book Machine. Here is her report.

The DTBM is currently in the prototype stage. Now that the prototype has been made and tested, the manufacturer will be making the first run of machines, which will also be tested. The machine is about half the size and weight of the current cassette book machine, and the battery will last about 30 hours before it needs to be recharged. It does not come with a carrying strap, but there are two places where the patron can attach their own strap. It has a place to plug in headphones, and a USB port on the side so that it can "talk" to other computer devices.

There are two versions of the DTBM—a standard player and one with more enhanced features. When you turn the machine on, it announces the title of the book that is in the machine, and how much longer the book will take to read. The new machine has soft touch buttons rather than hard keys. When you press the keys, the machine announces the function,

like "Forward one minute" or "back one minute", and pressing the key multiple times will make it perform the function several times over. The books will be tone indexed by chapter and parts to make it easy to skip forward or back through major portions of text. Both machines have a sleep feature where the user presses a button and the machine plays for 15 minutes longer and then stops. When you press the forward key 10 times in a row, the machine will announce the serial number.

The new "books" will be called "DBs" for digital books. The DB will contain a flash memory card inside a cartridge and it will have enough memory for almost every book. The cartridge is big enough to hold a print/Braille label that identifies the book. The mailing case is slightly smaller and thinner than the current green mailing case. We will continue to use the same mailing cards to mail books to patrons and for you to return the DBs back to us.

It will take a while – several years – for NLS to make and distribute enough DTBMs to be able to loan one to every patron. The network libraries will each receive 1 digital player next spring for demonstration purposes. NLS promises that we will get our first shipment of DTBMs for our patrons by late 2008. Veterans will receive first priority for the DTBMs.

SBPH will start a waiting list of patrons who want the new DTBMs in July 2008. In the meantime, we will keep patrons informed with both our newsletter, Louisiana Hotlines, and with our web site.

Not every title will be available on a DB and not every title will be available on cassette. Some old cassette books are being redone in digital format, so there are some titles that will be available in both formats. This means that SBPH patrons may have to borrow fewer books at a time, read them, and return them to the library before they are able to get more books. You may also be using both the cassette player and the DTBM until the switch is complete.

NLS has promised to stand behind the cassette players. NLS has ordered a lifetime supply of parts for the cassette players. There is a supply of more than 1,000,000 working machines in the network to keep patrons furnished with CBMs until the conversion from analog to digital is complete.

This library pledges to do its best to keep our patrons supplied with machines and books during the switch to digital talking books. We promise to keep our patrons up to date with news about the digital program, and to post information on our web site and publish it in our newsletter.

# Staffer Named Educator of the Year

On March 31, 2007 the National Federation of the Blind of Louisiana (NFBL) presented the 2007 "Educator of the Year" award to State Library of Louisiana (SLOL) librarian Emma K. Schroth. Schroth, Children and Teen Services Librarian, was recognized for her commitment to increasing opportunities and enriching the lives of blind children throughout Louisiana.

"The State Library of Louisiana offers so much to all citizens of this state," said Lt. Gov. Mitch Landrieu, whose office in the Department of Culture, Recreation and Tourism oversees the State Library. "In our efforts to see that every Louisiana citizen has access to literature, we strive to ensure that each child in Louisiana has the opportunity to grow and learn, regardless of that child's circumstances."

Schroth has worked with children and young adults for over 10 years at SLOL's Services for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. She takes care of their individual reading needs throughout the year, provides service to schools and coordinates an annual summer reading program.

"I know that Emma feels honored to receive such a wonderful award from the Louisiana NFB," said Rebecca Hamilton, State Librarian. "The State Library of Louisiana is fortunate in that our staff are truly committed to the needs of our patrons. I am proud of Emma. She typifies the care and compassion demonstrated by the entire Library staff."

The National Federation of the Blind of Louisiana is an organization of hundreds of blind and visually impaired Louisianans who believe that with the appropriate training, attitude and opportunities, blind people can and do achieve their dreams.

Angèle Davis, Secretary of the Office of the Department of Culture, Recreation & Tourism, under which the SLOL falls, expressed her pride. "I know that Emma is devoted to her work in serving the needs of the sight impaired and physically handicapped," said Davis. "She is an exceptional example of the work that the State Library of Louisiana does."
