Braille Music Survey


The Music Section in cooperation with the North America/Caribbean Regional delegation of the World Blind Union has made a commitment to examine the status of braille music transcription in North America and to determine if there is a need to increase the capacity to produce it.

To this end, a survey has been developed to access and document the status of and need for braille music.

We encourage anyone with interests in braille music to complete the survey.
