ELIGIBILITY

Any Louisiana resident who is unable to read or use standard print materials as a result of a temporary or permanent visual or physical limitation is eligible to receive free library services.

Assistive Technology, LATAN and the Jones Foundation

There are many devices, from watches to remote controls to computers, that can be adapted and specialized to make everyday life a bit easier for persons with disabilities. Telephones with large buttons and amplified speakers, extralarge playing cards and devices that increase a person's grip or dexterity can be helpful in many homes. The Louisiana Assistive Technology Action Network, or LATAN, has a demonstration center in Baton Rouge where people can preview special devices, equipment and computer programs and actually try them out before making a purchase. LATAN has a range of equipment for people with blindness or low vision, from inexpensive, low tech devices to high tech and more costly things. People can try out a range of low vision equipment like CCTVs, a hand-held "Amigo" portable CCTV, and computers fitted out with JAWS, ZoomText and other programs. Mona Miley, the Assistive Technology Specialist, is a walking, talking storehouse of information

about special gear and computer programs that can be used by people with low vision or people with physical disabilities. She is happy to arrange a tour of the facility and to demonstrate the hundreds of devices that are on display. LATAN does not sell assistive equipment, but the staff will help a person choose the most useful and least expensive option and will provide information about how to purchase adaptive equipment. LATAN staffers will answer questions over the telephone.


