

Louisiana Voices Celebrates 100th Recording!

Louisiana Voices, the volunteer audiobook

recording program at the State Library of Louisiana, recently recorded its 100th book since the program began nearly 3 years ago. Volunteer narrators, producers, and reviewers work with studio staff to turn unique Louisiana books into recorded cassettes that are available for loan to all the patrons of SBPH. "The *Louisiana Voices* program is extremely successful, and that success is due to the energy and commitment of our volunteers," notes Christy Reeves, the program manager.

"The NLS collection of recorded cassettes is a fine one, but with the

Louisiana Voices program we are able to supplement NLS titles with books that have a special Louisiana flair or appeal," said Elizabeth Perkins, Coordinator of Special Services. You Are My Sunshine (RCL 00157), Gus Weill's biography of Governor Jimmy Davis, was the first book recorded by the studio. Cross to Bear (RCL 00242), by John Maginnis, the story of the tumultuous 1992 gubernatorial election that pitted Buddy Roemer against Edwin Edwards and David Duke, was the 100th book produced by Louisiana Voices. The program has focused on Louisiana history and politics, because these are unique aspects of Louisiana culture. Additionally, volunteer readers have turned out fiction by Louisiana authors, children's books, cookbooks, sports books, travel guides, and more. The studio has committed to the project of producing recorded cassettes for all the books included in the annual Louisiana Young Reader's Choice Award contest. "Recording these titles increases the number of high quality books available to younger readers and allows blind, handicapped, and reading disabled kids to participate in the statewide annual balloting for the award," said Emma Schroth, Youth Services Librarian.

Issues of Louisiana Hotlines are recorded in the *Louisiana Voices* studio and studio staff are working on a catalog of *Louisiana Voices* titles so that SBPH readers can have better access to these books. This catalog will be produced in both large print and on audiocassette and distributed to all interested readers. Look for an announcement about the *Louisiana Voices* catalog in the next issue of Louisiana Hotlines.

And the Oscar Goes to....

The beginning of a new year always marks off the movie awards season. But did you know that many of these films you see at the cinema are also adapted from books? Here are a few titles available in our collection that has garnered some critical acclaim over the past few months.

Big Fish by Daniel Wallace. William
Bloom's father is dying, and William
has a great need to understand this
man who was never at home. As
they spend time together, the old
man continues his habit of telling
jokes, leaving William with little
knowledge of who his father really
is. (BR 13183*; LP 12002)

Cold Mountain by Charles Frazier. A wounded Confederate soldier leaves the war on an arduous trek to his mountain home and the woman he aims to marry.

Meanwhile, his intended struggles to work her deceased father's hardscrabble farm. Strong language and violence. Bestseller.

Girl with a Pearl Earring by Tracy
Chevalier. A fictional account of how
the seventeenth-century artist
Vermeer came to paint a portrait of
a young woman wearing a pearl
earring. When sixteen-year-old
Griet, a Protestant, becomes a
maid in Vermeer's Catholic
household, the drudgery of her

duties is offset by working in the artist's studio. Some descriptions of sex. Bestseller. (RC 50258; BR 13360*; LP 11500)

House of Sand and Fog by Andre
Dubus. Because of a tax-office
error, recovering addict Kathy
Lazaro is evicted from the
bungalow she inherited from her
father. The house is bought by an
Iranian looking for the American
dream. Correcting this mistake
leads to a legal tussle with dire
results. Some descriptions of sex,
some violence, and some strong
language. Bestseller.

Master and Commander by Patrick
O'Brian. This historical sea tale
chronicles the adventures of Jack
Aubrey of the Royal Navy, master
and commander of the brig Sophia,
as he and his crew battle the
French and Spanish in the
Mediterranean during the
Napoleonic wars.

Mystic River by Dennis LeHane. Sean, Jimmy, and Dave were eleven when Dave was abducted from a Boston slum. Twenty-five years later, ex-con Jimmy's daughter is murdered and Dave becomes a suspect. Sean, now a homicide detective, is assigned to the case. Strong language, some explicit descriptions of sex, and some violence. (RC 51758)

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NOW OPEN! Magnifiers and More The Joe W. and Dorothy Dorsett Brown Foundation Visual Aids

The Lighthouse for the Blind in New Orleans has recently opened **Magnifiers and More**, a visual aids store, aimed at helping customers maximize their mobility and independence. They also sell items manufactured at the Lighthouse by people who are visually impaired or blind.

At **Magnifiers and More**, you can find magnifiers, lighting, talking clocks and watches, closed circuit TVs, canes, kitchen utensils, screen magnification software, glare-reducing glasses, signature guides, tactile markers, and much more. They also have books and other literature to inform the public about vision problems.
