Spooky Mystery/Thriller Recommendations for the Fall

DB92117 *The Death of Mrs. Westaway* by Ruth Ware. On a day that begins like any other, Hal receives a mysterious letter bequeathing her a substantial inheritance. She realizes very quickly that the letter was sent to the wrong person, but that the cold-reading skills she's honed as a tarot card reader might help her claim the money. Soon, Hal finds herself at the funeral of the deceased, where it dawns on her that there is something very wrong about this strange situation and the inheritance at the center of it.

DB74810 *Curiosity Thrilled the Cat* by Sofie Kelly. After she rescues two stray cats, small-town librarian Kathleen Paulson discovers there may be more to felines Owen and Hercules than normal kitty behavior. When a murder disrupts a music festival and Kathleen becomes the prime suspect, Owen and Hercules help her to solve the crime.

DB93996 *The Silent Patient*

by Alex Michaelides. Alicia Berenson, a famous painter married to a fashion photographer, lives in a grand house in one of London's most desirable areas. One evening after her husband returns home late from a fashion shoot, Alicia shoots him five times in the face, and then never speaks another word. What really happened that night? Theo Faber, Alicia's psychotherapist, is determined to get her to speak.

DB75439 *The Diviners* by Libba Bray.

Evie O'Neill has been exiled from her boring hometown and shipped off to the bustling streets of New York City, and she is ecstatic! It's 1926, and New York is filled with speakeasies, Ziegfeld girls, and rakish pickpockets. The only catch is that she has to live with her uncle Will and his unhealthy obsession with the occult. Evie worries he'll discover her darkest secret: a supernatural power that has only brought her trouble so far. But when the police find a murdered girl branded with a cryptic symbol and Will is called to the scene, Evie realizes her gift could help catch a serial killer.

DB84620 *Red Platoon: A True Story of American Valor* by Clinton Romesha. Medal of Honor recipient describes the October 2009 attack on American Combat Outpost Keating in Afghanistan. Describes the architecture of the fort, which made it a vulnerable target; the troops and locals with whom he served; the battle; and courageous acts performed during it. Commercial audiobook. 2016.

DB92138 *The Operator Firing the Shots that Killed Osama bin Laden and My Years as a SEAL Team Warrior* by Robert O'Neill. The author, SEAL Team Operator, recalls his four hundred-mission career (including attempted rescues of Afghan ambush survivor Marcus Luttrell and Somali pirate hostage Captain Richard Phillips), which culminated in the shooting of terrorist Osama bin Laden. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2017.

DB87007 *All the Gallant Men: An American Sailor's Firsthand Account of Pearl Harbor* by Donald Stratton. One of five living survivors from aboard the USS Arizona during the Pearl Harbor surprise attack in 1941, Donald Stratton recounts his harrowing escape from the burning ship amid enemy fire, his ultimate recovery, and his determination to return to the fight. Violence. 2016.

DB74166 *American Sniper: The Autobiography of the Most Lethal Sniper in U.S. Military History* by Chris Kyle. Texas ranch hand-turned-Navy SEAL recalls his career as the sniper with the most kills in U.S. military history. Describes his training, his four tours of duty in Iraq, and the strains of deployment on his family life. Violence and strong language. Bestseller. 2012.

DB92021 *Vets and Pets: Wounded Warriors and the Animals that Help Them Heal* by Dava Guerin. A collection of essays about the bonds that develop between wounded veterans and the animals that help them heal. Includes stories of traditional service dogs as well as vets who bond with horses, birds of prey, and even pigs. 2017.

DB87919 *In the Footsteps of the Band of Brothers: A Return to Easy Company's Battlefields with Sergeant Forrest Guth* by Larry Alexander. The author explores the World War II battlefields that made Easy Company a legend, accompanied by Easy veteran Sergeant Forrest Guth. They follow the path taken by the famed Band of Brothers, revisiting the living history of the places where they went into action. Commercial audiobook. 2010.

DB85247 *We Gotta Get Out of This Place: The Soundtrack of the Vietnam War* by Doug Bradley. A Vietnam veteran and a college professor present a history of the music of the Vietnam War, arranged chronologically. The authors share interviews with soldiers of diverse races and experiences, discuss the various ways soldiers acquired new music, and illustrate the importance of music to those serving. Some strong language. 2015.

DB71795 *Heart of a Patriot: How I Found the Courage to Survive Vietnam, Walter Reed, and Karl Rove* by Max Cleland. Memoir by a triple-amputee veteran of the Vietnam War who was also a U.S. senator from Georgia. Cleland describes his tour of duty, rehabilitation at Walter Reed hospital, and entrance into state and national politics. Highlights his continuing battle with depression and post-traumatic stress disorder. Some strong language. 2009.

DB68700 *The American Patriot's Almanac* by William J. Bennett. Bennett, author of *The Book of Virtues*

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(DB37818) and America: The Last Best Hope (DB63365 and DB65535), and Cribb present a year of daily entries celebrating U.S. history. January features "Twelve Reasons to Love a Great Country." Includes presidential addresses, flag etiquette, documents, and songs. 2008.

Access NFB-Newslines Content with Alexa

NFB-NEWSLINE subscribers can access NFB-NEWSLINE hands-free on any Amazon Alexa product, including Echo and Echo Dot. Below are some sample commands for accessing and using the skill.

Enable the NFB-NEWSLINE Skill

- Say, "Alexa open National Federation."
- To hear instructions about the skill say, "Alexa ask National Federation to give me instructions."

Log in to NFB-NEWSLINE

You will need to log in the first time you open the skill.

- Say, "Alexa open National Federation."
- Then say, "Alexa ask National Federation to log in."
- State clearly, "Log in."
- Provide your subscriber identification number and security code.

Select Content and Navigate Sections and Articles

Alexa can help you select and move through publications easily with a

variety of commands. Here are a few to get you started:

- "Alexa ask National Federation to read The New York Times."
- "Alexa ask National Federation to read The Wall Street Journal."
- "Alexa ask National Federation to read next section."
- "Alexa ask National Federation to go to previous section."
- Move from article to article by simply saying "Next" or "Previous." (Please note: all other commands need to begin with "Alexa ask National Federation.")
- Alter Reader Voice and Speed
- "Alexa ask National Federation to change voice."
- "Alexa ask National Federation to read a little faster."
- "Alexa ask National Federation to read a little slower."
- "Alexa ask National Federation to read much faster."
- "Alexa ask National Federation to read much slower."

- "Alexa ask National Federation to email me this article."

General Help Command

- "Alexa ask National Federation to give me instructions."

Need Homework Help? Check out HomeworkLA

If you need homework help, the State Library of Louisiana offers an online resource available at www.homeworkla.org. Homework Louisiana provides live tutoring for grades K-12, college and adult education, test preparation, and job search assistance to all Louisiana residents. Academic tutoring is now available from 2 p.m. to midnight seven days a week. Self-study tools for AP, ACT/SAT, and GED are also available 24/7. In addition, there is a “connect with voice” option for the visually impaired. Students may now access this service from any internet-connected computer or mobile device during these hours, even from a school campus after 2:00 pm.
