# **New USPS Return Policy**

Since the pandemic, the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) has instituted new policies for pickup of packages such as braille and digital books due to staff shortages, turnover, and seasonal workers.

Patrons can use an online form at https://tools.usps.com/schedule-pickup-steps.htm to schedule pickup of library materials or call 800-ASK-USPS (800-275-8777). This optional service could help improve the return of materials to the library.

## **Tips for Walk-In Users**

Readers are always welcome to walk-in to the Talking Books and Braille Library to return materials and/or to pick up new ones.

Please help us serve you better by calling the TBBL at least two hours in advance of your arrival; this gives your reader adviser enough time to select and retrieve your materials and reduces the time you will spend waiting to pick up your items.

A mix of free and metered parking is available across from the library on North 4th Street and on Spanish Town Road. Visitors with handicap permits may park for free in the lot between the Iberville Building and the State Library; access is from North 3rd Street.

All visitors can park in the LaSalle Parking Garage located at 227 Main St.,

Baton Rouge, LA 70802. Parking may be validated at the State Library Circulation Desk with a license plate number.

To VALIDATE PARKING when PARKED in LASALLE GARAGE and visiting the State Library of Louisiana:

- Within 30 minutes of parking, open your camera or QR Reader App on your smart phone and scan the QR code posted at the Circulation or Reference desk.
- Click on the link to open ParkLync website.
- Enter password: OSL (in all caps)
- Enter license plate number and duration of stay.
- Click "Submit."

If you do not have a smartphone, please see the Circulation/Reference desk on the first floor for assistance.

# **Affordable Connectivity Program**

The Affordable Connectivity Program is a Federal Communications Commission program that helps connect families and households struggling to afford internet service. This new benefit provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward broadband service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands.

Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers.

Eligible households can enroll through a participating broadband provider or directly with the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) using an online or mail in application.

# National Blindness Awareness Month

October is National Blindness Awareness Month, an initiative started to help the public understand the realities of visual impairment and how it affects the world population. According to recent

CDC data, approximately six million Americans have vision loss and one million have blindness.

## **Books by Blind Authors**

In honor of the numerous courageous and talented blind men and women of our country, Sneha Padumane has compiled a bibliography of blind authors.

**DB 96188** Haben: The Deafblind Woman Who Conquered Harvard Law by Haben Girma

The autobiography of the first deaf-blind graduate of Harvard Law School. Girma describes her childhood, world travels, development of a text-to-braille communication system, and time at Harvard Law, as well as the ways she uses her talents to advocate for those with disabilities.

**DB 55883** The Story of My Life by Helen Keller

The restored classic autobiography of an exceptional young woman and her companion, originally published in 1903, with 2003 commentary by editor Roger Shattuck. Helen Keller's own account of her transformation is followed by her teacher Anne Sullivan's record of their early years together and insights of Anne's husband, John Macy.

**DB 32896** Almost Like a Song by Ronnie Milsap

Taken in by dirt-poor, but loving grandparents after his mother rejected him, Ronnie was soon sent off to a school for the blind. There, among other things, he learned discipline, determination, and classical music--acquirements that shaped his boyhood, his career, and his success as a country music superstar. His inspiring story reveals little-known aspects of the music industry where he rose to the top.

**DB 81198** The Barefoot Lawyer: A Blind Man's Fight for Justice and Freedom in China by Chen Guangcheng.

Chen grew up poor and blind in rural China, becoming an activist on behalf of disability rights. He was imprisoned by the Chinese government for four years, and he and his family were under house arrest until his daring escape to the American embassy in 2012.

**DB 45500** *Planet of the Blind* by Stephen Kuusisto

Although legally blind since birth, Kuusisto passed as sighted for more than 30 years. He describes his refracted visual perceptions and how pretending to see actually interfered with his participation in the sighted world. Then, by using a white cane and, eventually, a guide dog, he experienced new acceptance and mobility.

**DB 16618** Brother Ray: Ray Charles' Own Story by Ray Charles

Candid autobiography of the musician who was born black and poor in the Deep South, became blind as a small boy and was orphaned as a teenager. At 32 he was acclaimed as a musical genius.

DB 16597 Face to Face by Ved Mehta

The highly successful author, who has been blind since the age of three, tells what it was like to grow up in a cultured, but not wealthy, Hindu family in the Punjab, at Rawalpindi, Simla, and Bombay.

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He describes the terror of the Muslim-Hindu riots at Lahore during partition and his college life in the United States.

**DB 105634** Being Seen: One Deafblind Woman's Fight to End Ableism by Elsa Sjunneson

In this memoir, award-winning author Elsa Sjunneson, who identifies as Deafblind, discusses growing up and living in an ableist world. Sjunneson, also a professor and activist, explores how the misrepresentation of disability in books, movies, and TV harms both the disabled community and everyone else.

**DB 16674** Ordinary Daylight: Portrait of an Artist Going Blind by Andrew Potok.

Potok, scion of the Maximilian furs family as well as a painter of note, describes with humor his attempts to delay the effects of retinitis pigmentosa, an inherited, progressive, eye disease. Potok relates with comic effect his supposed "cure" with bee-sting therapy in London, and shares his concerns for his marriage and for his daughter, who also bears the genetic defect.

**DB 75761** Do You Dream in Color: Insights from a Girl without Sight by Laurie Rubin.

Rubin, a blind mezzo-soprano opera singer born with perfect pitch and Leber's Amaurosis--a disease that prevents the retina from developing-recounts her idyllic California childhood learning to read braille, use a cane, and taking voice lessons. Highlights her struggles getting roles because of her disability.
