#### Introducing Duplication on Demand – A New Way to Serve TBBL Patrons

The Talking Books and Braille Library is now serving patrons with a new system called Duplication on Demand (DoD). This new system allows us to do two things. First, it allows us to load multiple books onto just one cartridge. This means that five or ten or even 15 books can be loaded onto each cartridge. You will be receiving fewer cartidges in the mail, but each cartridge will come loaded with multiple audio books. Second, this new system gives us access to all audio titles available on BARD, so we are not limited by the physical copies we have in stock; Therefore, we no longer have to rely on interlibrary loan to get out-of-stock book titles. Duplication on Demand means that all books are always available.

We are starting the process of moving all of our established audio readers to DoD. This will take a while, as each reader must be set up individually. DoD settings will be based on your current account profile, but these settings can be changed at your request. If you would like to switch to DoD right away, please contact us, and we'll set you up.

Here's what to expect when you start getting DoD cartridges. Our general guidelines are:

- Each cartridge may have as many as 8 to 15 books on it.
- Each reader can have up to three cartridges checked out at once.
- To return cartridges, simply flip the mailing card over as before.
- Once a cartridge gets back to us, we'll send you another one. It's important to send cartridges back right away to prevent gaps in service.
- If you want to reread a book or cartridge, we can send it again.

#### **Bookshelf Feature**

When the audio cartridge you are listening to has multiple books loaded onto it, you can use the Bookshelf feature of the audiobook player to find out how many books are on your cartridge, to hear a list of the titles, and to select which book you would like to listen to next.

To enter the bookshelf feature, press and hold the large green rectangular play/ stop button near the player's front edge for three seconds. When you enter the bookshelf, the player will announce the number of books on the cartridge and the title of the currently selected book. Press the rewind or fast forward buttons on either side of the play/stop button to locate the book you wish to read. When you hear the entire title of the book you wish to read, press the play/stop button and that book will be selected and start playing.

When you are ready to read another book, return to the bookshelf by pressing and holding the play/stop button for three seconds. Use the rewind or fast forward to find the book you'd like to read, and then press the play/stop button to select it.

## **NEW Braille Calendars**

NLS will be producing two new Braille calendars for 2023. The first is a wallsized Braille calendar, and the second is a pocket-sized Braille calendar.

Calendars for 2023 are expected to be available by mid-July. Those calendars will extend through January 2024. Going forward, subscribers will automatically receive new annual calendars when they are published.

#### 2023 Adult Summer Reading Program

The TBBL 2023 Adult Summer Reading Program will start May 1, 2023, and will run through August 31. The theme this year is "All Together Now". If you complete the program by reading 20 books, you will be entered into a drawing to win a Tel-Time Talking Key Chain that gives an audio time report along with an alarm, hourly time announcements, and an LCD black number display.

If you participated last year, then you will automatically be signed up for this year's program. If you are not already signed up, please contact your reader advisor! All you have to do to complete the program is to read 20 books. Audio books, Braille books, large print books and audio magazines all count. We will keep track of your reading history. Or, if you would like, we will mail you a reading log. If you complete the program by reading 20 books, then your name will be entered into the drawing for one of the prizes. If you have a reading log, you can return it to us by mail or call to give us the list over the phone.

If you need any reading suggestions, please ask us; we are happy to help! One entry per person. We will choose 18 lucky winners from the list of those who have read at least 20 books. A big thank you goes to the Jones Foundation for providing the prizes!

**Spring 2023 Book Recommendations** by Sneha Padumane

(**DB 107455**) *Jewel of the Nile* by Tessa Afshar

While her dark skin is proof that her father was Cushite, Chariline knows nothing else about her parents. While visiting her grandfather before his retirement as the Roman official in the queen's court, Chariline overhears that her father is still alive.

# (**DB 102900**) *When the Stars Go Dark* by Paula McLain

When tragedy strikes seasoned missing persons detective Anna Hart's personal life, she flees to the northern California village of Mendocino to grieve. But when she arrives, it's to find out a local teenager is missing and the circumstances are reminiscent of a murder in Anna's childhood.

#### (**DB 102822**) *How to Think Like a Roman Emperor: The Stoic Philosophy of Marcus Aurelius* by Donald Robertson

An exploration of the life and philosophy of Roman emperor Marcus Aurelius, the final famous Stoic philosopher of the ancient world. A sportswriter looks at four legends of baseball. Trailblazing African American players Larry Doby and Satchel Paige joined star pitcher Bob Feller and team owner Bill Veeck on the 1940s Cleveland Indians team, shaping the immediate postwar era of Major League Baseball and beyond.
