BARD's five-device limit

Patrons who use purchased players or Android or Apple devices for downloading books are limited to five devices. All of your devices will be listed in your BARD account. If you have stopped using a device, you must call your reader advisor and ask for the device to be deleted from your account.

You must also delete the BARD mobile app from any device before you sell or give it away because you are the only authorized user of the service.

Increase number of books

If you have been using the TBBL service for at least a year and you are interested in increasing the number of books sent to you, contact your reader advisor at 225.342.0035 or toll free at 800.543.4702.

Using Bookshelf feature of your digital book player

If you have multiple books or magazines on a single digital book cartridge, then you need to use the **Bookshelf** feature of your digital book player in order to navigate from book to book or magazine issue to magazine issue. It is easy! Here's how:

1. Insert the cartridge into the digital player.
2. Hold down the green, rectangular shaped Play/Stop button until you hear the word, "**Bookshelf.**"
3. Release the Play/Stop button and tap the white arrow-shaped **Fast Forward** button to the right of the Play/Stop button to move through the titles on the cartridge until you hear the title of the magazine or book you want to read. Use the white, arrow-shaped **Rewind** button to the left of the Play/Stop button to move back the other way through the list of titles.

Check out TumbleBookLibrary

TumbleBookLibrary is an online, interactive collection of storybooks, chapter books, nonfiction, language learning, puzzles, and games provided at no cost to you by the State Library of Louisiana for those in kindergarten through sixth grade. The collection includes several read along tiles, and for those who read large print, the text can easily be enlarged. You can also change the background color if needed. 2019 Louisiana Readers’ Choice nominees

The 2019 Louisiana Readers’ Choice program is a reading enrichment program of the Louisiana Center for the Book in the State Library of Louisiana. There are three categories: grades 3-5, grades 6-8, and Teen Readers’ Choice for grades 9-12. Students read from the nominated titles during 2018 and vote on their favorite by February 1, 2019. To qualify, students must be from Louisiana and have read three of the titles in the appropriate grade category. You can help decide who will win! To cast your vote, call 800.543.4702.

Grades 3-5:

DB85304 *Ada's Violin: The Story of the Recycled Orchestra of Paraguay* by Susan Hood. Ada's dream is to play music in Cateura, a small town built on a landfill in Paraguay. Favio Chávez, an engineer and musician, recycled garbage into musical instruments and taught the kids to play, earning him global recognition.

DB89176, LP25817 *Seven and a Half Tons of Steel* by Janet Nolan and Thomas Gonzalez. Following the terrorist attack on September 11, 2001, a steel beam from the World Trade Center was given to the Navy and subsequently used to create the bow for the warship USS New York.

BARD BR21759, DB83449 *Soar* by Joan Bauer. Jeremiah is determined to coach his middle school's baseball team. As a heart transplant recipient, he can't play, but Jeremiah doesn't let that slow him down in pursuing his coaching dreams.

DB88368 *Step Right Up: How Doc and Jim Key Taught the World about Kindness* by Donna Janell Bowman. Recounts how William "Doc" Key, a former slave and self-trained veterinarian, taught his horse Jim to read and write and, together with Jim, became one of the most famous traveling performance acts around the turn of the twentieth century.

DB86072 *Wish* by Barbara O'Connor. When ten-year-old Charlie's dad goes to jail and her mom spends all day on the couch, Charlie reluctantly moves to the

country to live with her kin. There, with the help of a stray dog and a new friend, she discovers the true meaning of family.

DB86858 *Word of Mouse* by James Patterson. After a dramatic escape from a mysterious laboratory, Isaiah is separated from his mouse family and has to use his special skills to survive in the dangerous outdoors and, hopefully, find his missing family.

LP25812 *My Life in Pictures* by Deborah Zemke. Bea Garcia's best friend moves to Australia. When a rambunctious boy moves into her old house, Bea must learn to make new friends.

Grades 6-8:

DB84472 *Booked* by Kwame Alexander. When Princess Harriet climbs an enormous beanstalk, she finds a giant rabbit is keeping a goose and a half-harp, half-hamster as prisoners. It's up to Harriet to save the day.

DB85754 *Fuzzy* by Tom Angleberger. When Max befriends her new robot classmate Fuzzy, she helps him navigate and together they reveal the truth behind the Robot Integration Program.

BARD BR21669, DB85921 *Ghost* by Jason Reynolds. Aspiring to be the fastest sprinter on his city's elite track team, gifted runner Ghost finds his goal challenged by a tragic past with an abusive, alcoholic father.

BARD BR21836, DB85739, LP25796 *The Girl Who Drank the Moon* by Kelly Regan Barnhill. Every year a community leaves a baby as an offering to a powerful witch. One infant--now a young girl--

is being raised by the witch and must unlock the magic buried deep inside her.

DB86730 *Projekt 1065* by Alan Gratz. 1943. Michael, son of the Irish ambassador to Nazi Germany, is also a spy for the British Secret Service. After joining the Hitler Youth, Michael stumbles on Projekt 1065. Suddenly, his situation becomes a lot more dangerous.

DBC08424 *The Thing about Leftovers* by C.C. Payne. After her parents divorce, Fizzy feels like a leftover from their marriage. Dad has remarried and is expecting a baby with his new wife, while Mom is marrying a man Fizzy doesn't like. She sets her sights on winning the Southern Living Cook-off.

DB90156 *Top Prospect* by Paul Volponi. Travis gets the opportunity of a lifetime when the coach of the Gainesville University him a scholarship before he even starts high school. Suddenly, Travis is facing mounting pressure to succeed.

Teen Readers' Choice:

Teens must read two selections from the nominated title list in order to vote.

DB87030 *The Female of the Species* by Mindy McGinnis. Loner Alex Craft embraces the darkness after her sister's killer walks free. Circumstances force her to befriend two teens at a local animal shelter. Alex confronts new evil in her small town.

DB83752 *Riders* by Veronica Rossi. Eighteen-year-old Army Ranger Gideon Blake discovers that he is War, one of the Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse. Together with Conquest, Famine, and Death, he must save humanity.

DB86810 *Scythe* by Neal Shusterman. In a future where natural death has been eliminated, the only way to die is to be gleaned by reapers known as scythes. Teens Citra and Rowan are chosen for a scythe apprenticeship--a position neither of them wants.

DB86277, LP25797 *Heartless* by Marissa Meyer. Cath would rather open a bakery and marry for love than accept a proposal from the King of Hearts, especially after meeting the handsome and mysterious court jester.

DB84363 *Highly Illogical Behavior* by John Corey Whaley. Agoraphobic Solomon has not left his house in three years, but Lisa is determined to change that and get into a top psychology school based on the results.

DB83873 *The Serpent King* by Jeff Zentner. Musician Dill and his two friends contemplate their futures during their final year of high school.

BARD BR21806, DB86028 *The Sun is Also a Star* by Nicola Yoon. Natasha and Daniel meet at the worst possible time, but they believe there is something extraordinary in store for them.

DB87022 *This is Our Story* by Ashley Elston. When a hunting accident claims a boy's life, his best friends come under suspicion. Kate, a fellow student and intern at the district attorney's office, helps investigate the case.

DB86706 *Three Dark Crowns* by Kendare Blake. Triplets Mirabella, Katharine and Arsinoe possess unique magical abilities. Once they turn sixteen, they must battle each other for the throne.
